CALL TO ORDER – Chairperson Bob Motta called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm

Barbara Bolland suggested a California Coastal Live Oak Tree to be the replacement tree at Library Park.

C. NEW BUSINESS

2. Tree Replacement Library Park

Acting Parks Superintendent Joseph Casillas presented the tree replacement options for Library Park. Chairperson Motta commented on the replacement options being mostly surface rooted and his concerns with damages it may cause, droppings of trees, and how they hold up with strong winds. He also stated that the Canary Pine should be placed once again being that its deep rooted. Acting Parks Superintendent Casillas provided additional information.

Commissioner Stolnack stated that the location of the tree replacement is the focal point of Library Park therefore she recommends a California Sycamore Tree or a native tree. Commissioner Cavagnolo requested justification as to why the tree options were chosen. Commissioner Lubs stated that this should be an operational decision and not based on personal preference of the Commissioners. Commissioner Watson requested a list of criteria and stated that a native would be ideal.

MOTION by Commissioner Cavagnolo, SECONDED by Commissioner Lubs to bring back a tree replacement report with recommendations, MOTION PASSED. 5/0

D. DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Director of Recreation, Parks, and Library Aly Mancini presented the Director's Report to the Commission. The Commission asked questions regarding trashcans in Washington Park, fundraising for the tree relocation, and capital improvement projects. Director Mancini provided additional information.

Director Mancini introduced the new Senior Administrative Analyst, Khan Watson to the Committee.

E. STAFF COMMENTS

Recreation Manager Linnea Palmer spoke about the change in dates for the Snowboard Trip, Tiny Tot T-Rex Party, Youth Basketball season wrap up, all-star teams competing, and drama shows.

F. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner Stolnack spoke about including Commissioner's names to each comment instead of generalizing the comments to the whole Committee on the minutes.

Commissioner Cavagnolo updated the Commission regarding fundraising of the Plunge, change order of the tiles and work time extending, and the creation of a working group to explore scoring adjustments for Aquatics.

Commissioner Lubs welcomed Senior Administrative Analyst, Khan Watson.

Vice Chairperson Watson updated the Commission regarding the Field Allocation Subcommittee and the work done for the policy update. She also welcomed Senior Administrative Analyst, Khan Watson.

Chairperson Motta thanked Barbara Bolland and Khan Watson for attending the meeting. He also stated that the tree replacement process should be done right with more research included.

TITLE: Replacement Tree for Library Park Tree

RECOMMENDATION:

1. Select a replacement tree to be planted in Library Park.
2. Alternatively, discuss and take other action related to this item

FISCAL IMPACT:

A 36" box replacement tree will cost \$450 and \$600. Any larger tree size will vary in cost due to contractor installation with crane equipment.

BACKGROUND:

A mature Canary Island Pine tree donated by the El Segundo Women's Club (1930) located at Library Park died and was removed March 3, 2025, by West Coast Arborists.

DISCUSSION:

Staff is recommending that the Recreation and Parks Commission select a replacement tree for the Canary Island Pine tree that was removed in March 2025.

Optional trees that may be considered:

Norfolk Island Pine

The Norfolk Island Pine is an evergreen tree with moderate growth rate to 100 ft. tall and 60 ft. wide. The tree has a pyramidal shape, bright green foliage and resembles the shape of the tree that was removed.

Brisbane Box

The Brisbane Box tree is a large evergreen tree with moderate to fast growth rate to 45 ft. tall and 25 ft. wide. The tree features reddish-brown bark flaking off to light colored bark beneath, oval bright green leaves 4-6 inches long and white to cream flowers in summer followed by woody capsules. It does well in lawn areas and is a good shade tree.

California Sycamore

The California Sycamore is a deciduous California native tree with a fast growth rate up to 80 ft. tall and 25-50 ft. wide. The tree features multiple or leaning trunks with patchy bark in brown, gray and white, and deeply lobed leaves turn dusty brown in the fall. There are several currently in the park near the library building.

Coast Live Oak

The Coast Live Oak is a large evergreen native oak with a round head and dense foliage, to 20-70 ft. tall. The tree features a greater spread, dark grey bark deeply fissured in older trees and dark green leaves 1-3 inches long and appear toothed edge and holly like. The tree produces acorns and has greedy roots. It is considered slow growing and not well adjusted to lawn areas.

Council Items

March 18, 2025:

No Recreation, Parks, and Library related agenda items.

Council Member Comments-

Council Member Giroux proposed future agenda item for a staff presentation about user group metrics for clubs and teams use of the Aquatics. Councilmember Giroux requested the Recreation, Parks, and Library Director to present an overview of tennis and pickleball data regarding reservations, revenue, leagues for purposes of future planning at the April 1 City Council Meeting. Recreation, Parks, and Library staff will be presenting requested information at the April 15, 2025 meeting.

April 1, 2025:

Special Presentations

City Council proclaimed April 6th-12th as “National Library Week” in El Segundo. City Council commended outgoing inaugural Poet Laureate, Hope Anita Smith, with a for her time and service to the City of El Segundo from January 2022 through December 2023.

Arts and Culture Advisory Committee Chair, John Pickhaver, introduced new Poet Laureate Kweku Abimbola.

Modifications to the Salary Ranges for Aquatics Staff

At the meeting of April 1, 2025, City Council approved modifications to the salary ranges for Part-Time Aquatics Classifications.

El Segundo Cultural Arts Master Plan

The Arts and Culture Advisory Committee presented their proposed El Segundo Cultural Arts Master Plan. Council approved the following policy and program recommendations:

1. Direct the City of El Segundo to seek grant funding for public art and programming as well as to develop a plan for fundraising opportunities to generate additional revenue sources.
2. Expand and enhance communication through website, social media, and City communications to better inform residents, employees, and visitors regarding programs and initiatives through the Cultural Development Fund.

3. Develop key performance indicators to provide denominators for outcomes, including impact on property values, retail spending, and ability to attract top-tier companies.

Cultural Development Fund Budget and Programming for Fiscal Year 2025-2026
City Council approved the following budget and initiatives for the Cultural Development Fund for fiscal year 25/26. In addition, City Council directed the ACC to fund all of Concerts in the Park for the upcoming fiscal year at \$16,500.

Operating Fund: \$7,500

Festival of Holidays: \$25,000

Community Engagement Fund: \$30,000

Art Walk: \$57,000

Literary Arts Fund: \$13,000

Visual Artists in Community: \$15,000

Donor Recognition & Engagement: \$7,500

Public Art Installation at the Urho Saari Swim Stadium: \$127,500

CIP Updates

Recreation Park Renovation Project:

50% Design Development plans and cost estimates have been completed and reviewed by City Staff. 100% design development plans are currently being worked on. A Geotechnical Investigation and a Percolation report for the proposed ballfield renovations is currently being reviewed.

Hilltop Park Project:

An architect has been retained by Public Works to submit plans to address the abandoned reservoirs at Hilltop Park. An additional land survey still needs to be completed. Public Works presented the project to the Park Renovation Subcommittee. Additional design plans for the open space will be presented to the Recreation and Park Commission at a later date.

Arts & Culture

Staffing

The City's Cultural Arts Coordinator submitted his resignation on December 19, 2024. The recruitment for the position will open at a later date.

Adult Sports

Adult 7v7 Soccer League

- The Winter 2025 adult soccer regular season concluded on March 14th. Playoffs for the top six teams began on March 21st.

- The league had a total of 9 teams and 108 participants.
 - 4 El Segundo Residents
 - 5 Non-Resident Teams
- The total revenue from registration is \$2,205.00
- Spring 2025 registration began March 12th and closed on April 3rd. Spring season will begin on April 18th.

Adult League Basketball

- The Winter 2025 adult basketball league regular season concluded on March 30th. Playoffs for the top four teams beginning on April 6th.
- The league had a total of 6 teams and 60 participants.

- The total revenue from registration is \$1,500.00
- Spring 2025 registration began March 5th and is ongoing. It is currently looking to be a 16-team league which will be a new record for participation. Spring season will begin April 8th.

Adult Pickleball Leagues

- The Winter 2025 adult pickleball leagues began on Monday, January 20th and will run through March, with playoffs in early April due to rain-out days.
- The league has a total of 115 teams and 1,380 participants.

 - 110 Non-Resident Teams
- The total revenue from registration is \$41,730.00

Youth Sports

Youth Basketball League

- The El Segundo Youth Basketball All-Star teams played a total of seven games from February through March.
- There was a total of two All-Star teams coached entirely by Recreation Staff. The breakdown of the teams is below:
 - 5th/6th Grade Team: 8 Participants
 - 7th/8th Grade Team: 12 Participants
- The All-Stars played in a tournament on March 22nd at South Gate. The 7th/8th Grade team won the Consolation Championship.

Teen Center

In March, the Teen Center remained fully staffed and open for drop-in use six days a week, totaling 24 operational days. Over the month, the center saw an impressive 1,892 visits from teens. To boost engagement and encourage attendance, the Teen Center started “Thrilling Thursday” events to include crafts, challenges, and trivia each Thursday. Additional programming for March included Watch and Build, where teens were able to watch Mufasa and build a Lion King themed Lego set. Lastly, the 2025 Teen Center Snow Trip took place with 35 teens in attendance. For March, the average hourly attendance was approximately 13 teens per hour.

Gordon Clubhouse

The Clubhouse and its various rooms were reserved/activated a total of 182 times totaling, 288 hours in March for recreation activities, youth drama program, camps, Co-op, Family Wellness Studio, meetings, and rentals.

Water aerobics served 261 individuals generating \$1,722 in revenue.

In March, the Aquatics Center hosted LA County Lifeguards for the Junior Lifeguard Tryout. This rental brought in \$3,549 and served over 650 people.

Interviews for 20 lifeguards were conducted in March as we begin to hire for the Plunge facility.

Over the course of March, 11 staff trainings were hosted with the focus being Water Rescue Skills.

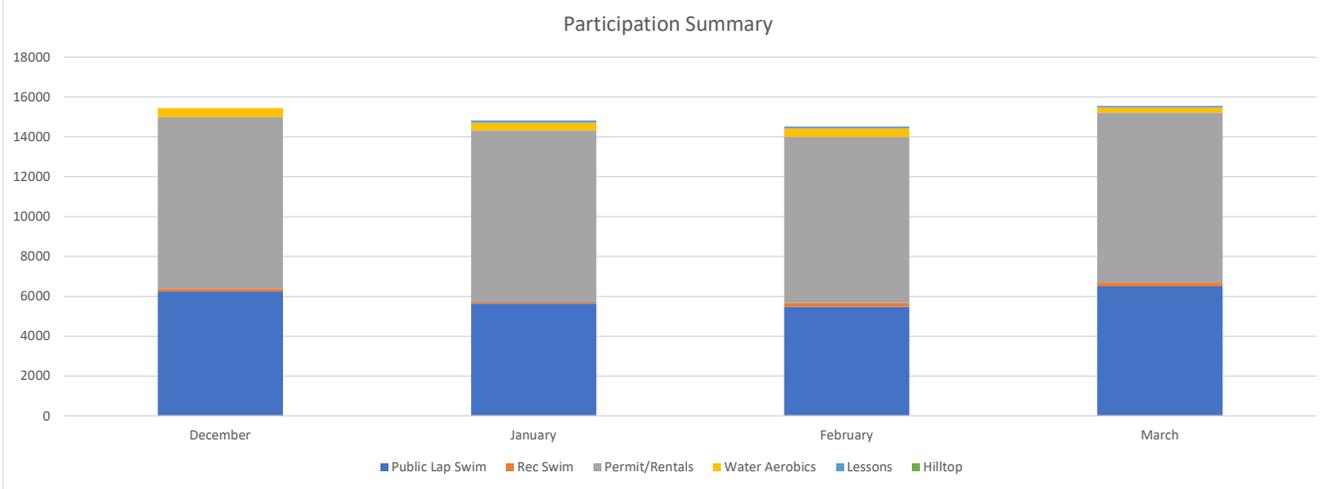

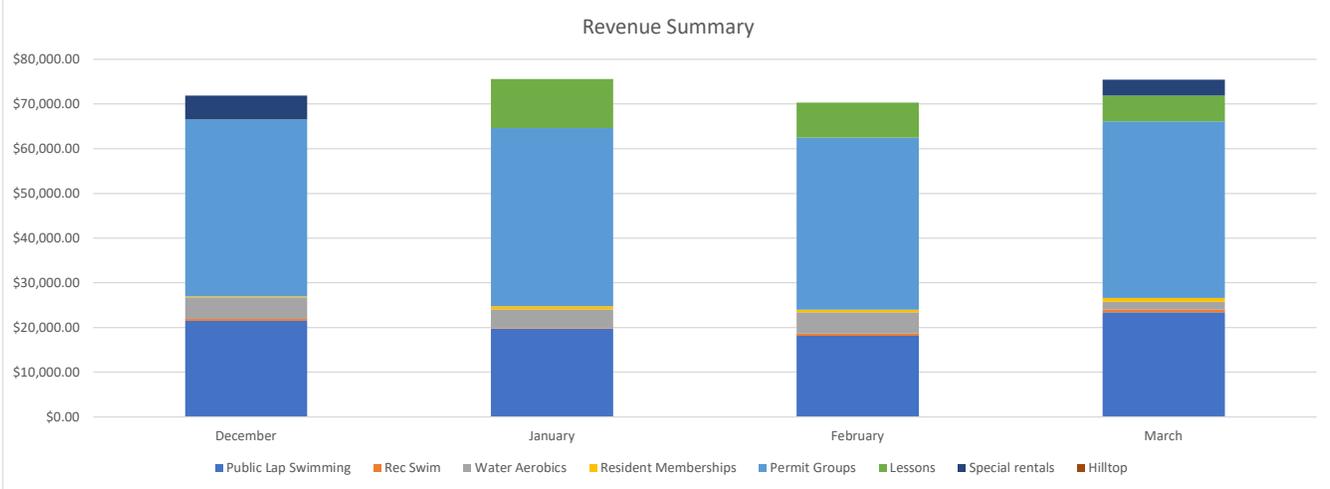
